Commemorates the 150th anniversary of Fred Coleman's arrival in Fredericton in 1872

COLEMAN FROG EXHIBIT REDEVELOPMENT

Dr. Cynthia Wallace-Casey and Exhibit Developer Doug Hall completed a major upgrade of the Coleman Frog display by recreating the foyer of the Barker House Hotel in the exhibit space. Visitors will get a sense of what it must have been like when Fred Coleman ran the Hotel in the late 19th century.

LEGEND OF THE COLEMAN FROG

Legend has it that the reptile once lived in Killarney Lake, where in 1887 Fred Coleman, owner and operator of the Barker House Hotel, established a summer hotel (site of present-day Killarney Lake Park).

At first, the Coleman Frog was like any other bullfrog, but he soon became a pet and as Mr. Coleman fed him whiskey, buttermilk, along with other table scraps, the frog grew in size to ultimately weigh 42 lbs!

OFFICERS' QUARTERS EXHIBIT

Shows connection to Garrison District



The new Officers' Quarters exhibit includes information about the British units that made Fredericton their home between 1784 and 1869.

The newly developed Officers' Quarters exhibit makes a direction connection to the historic Garrison District and the British units who once called Fredericton home before Confederation.

The exhibit was researched by Dr. Cynthia Wallace-Casey with assistance from Dr. Gary Campbell. Exhibit developer Doug Hall completely renovated the museum entrance to accommodate interpretive elements as well as a large collection of Pith Helmets that were worn by the British Units who were posted here.

This interesting project was made possible with a grant from the Provincial Heritage Branch, the City of Fredericton, YSHS and Canada's Cultural Spaces program.

Kiers Marketing designed and installed the graphics, bringing to life an early chapter in the history of the City of Fredericton.

1932-2022 EXHIBIT 90th Anniversary of YSHS


In 1932, the York Sunbury Historical Society (which runs the Fredericton Region Museum) was founded by a group of citizens under the leadership of Martha J. Harvey, of Harvey Studios on

Oueen Street.

That year more than 400 artefacts were donated to the Society, forming the basis of what eventually became nearly 24,000 artefacts and archival documents in the Museum's collection.


Spanning the breadth of time immemorial to modern day, the Museum's collection is one of which we are rightly proud.

With the lapse of COVID mandates businesses are wondering if they should continue with the strict rules we have been following for more than 2 years now. The Fredericton Region Museum COVID Committee has always taken a health and safety first approach to its COVID policies.

This is due in large part to the fact that the 180 year old Officers' Quarters building has narrow halls and stairways, small rooms and poor air circulation, particularly in

the colder months when the doors are closed. We also have to consider that as a museum, we tend to cater to families with young children who are not vaccinated and this is a risk for our employees, volunteers and other visitors, especially the elderly.

Given this reality, and the continuing presence of COVID in our community,

the Committee wisely decided to continue enforcing mask wearing and social distancing in the museum this summer 2022.

Visitors will also be advised to come back at another time if they are experiencing COVID symptoms.

The COVID Committee is led by Dr. Kanza Hashmat, (2nd Vice-President). Committee members include Hal Skaarup, Gary Campbell, Ian MacEacheron and Doug Hall.

SPEAKER SERIES ATTRACTS LARGE AUDIENCES

2021-2022 presentations will be published in next Officers' Quarters

When COVID forced us to shut down our popular monthly Speakers Series at Government House in March 2020, Charles Ferris, Chair of the Programmes Committee, was left with a burning problem to solve: how to keep the series alive when we can't meet in person?

Following the example of so many other organizations, we pivoted to an on line format using ZOOM and it worked.

Since September 2021, we gave 18 scholars, historians and subject matter experts the opportunity to tell the world about their favourite topic – from Manny MacIntyre (above) to the history of the Ripples Prisoner of War Camp to so many other fascinating New Brunswick stories that are just waiting to be told.

The Speaker Series was so successful that the presentations will become the basis of the next Officers' Quarters with 16 of the 18 presentations included in the publication. LIVE THEATRE AT THE MUSEUM

Every week starting July 19

The Fredericton Region Museum will feature original, LIVE theatre based on the life of Fred Coleman, whose Barker House Hotel once housed the world-famous Coleman Frog!

Performances will take place at the Museum every Tuesday at 1 pm starting July 19 to August 30 and every Wednesday at 1 pm from September 7 to 21.

The play will speak to Fred
Coleman's arrival in Fredericton
150 years ago in 1872 and how he
became owner of the Barker House
Hotel.

We'll learn how he acquired Heron Lake (which he renamed Killarney Lake) and built a summer residence there in 1887 - the same year, so legend says, he befriended the Coleman Frog.

We'll hear how Fred faced family tragedy with stoicism and spent two

months in jail for violating the Scott Act, which prohibited the sale of alcohol.

We'll also find out why he was given New Brunswick's Champion Liar Award in 1898!

COUNCIL OF ARCHIVES OF NB

A grant from the Council of Archives of NB will allow for the arrangement and description of the Morehouse Letters for inclusion in our MC300 Finding Aid at the Provincial Archives and the CANB website.

Dr. Oscar Emery Morehouse received his M.D, C.M. from McGill University in 1889. He represented York County in the NB Legislature in 1912 and 1917 and was District Medical Health Officer in Upper Keswick, York County.

The Morehouse Letters range from personal matters to his public duties as coroner and more interestingly, as a politician with all the expectations of patronage that came along with the position.

In the January 1913 letter below, when Morehouse was MLA, RB Hanson of Slipp & Hanson Barristers is asking Morehouse to use his influence with the Premier to give a man named William Logan a janitorial position at the "Bishopscope property". If anyone knows where that is, please let us know!



We are pleased to announced that the Wabanaki Way exhibit at the Fredericton Region Museum has been transformed into a virtual exhibition on line with significant funding from the Department of Canadian Heritage, Museums Assistance Program (MAP). This is our third MAP project in as many years and we are thrilled to see the benefits of federal

funding manifested in improved management of our Indigenous collection.

Additional financial and in-kind support came from project partners: The York Sunbury Historical Society, Three Nations Education Group and Workforce Warriors.

www.travelingthewabanakiway.com contains all the content found in the original bricks and mortar exhibit but in a virtual format.

Each artefact in the FRM's collection was professionally photographed by Michael Barnaby. The plan is to eventually upload all the artefact images to the site with descriptions and accession numbers included.

Led by Project Director Ramona Nicholas, with Sarah Masson, Project Assistant, this online exhibit was almost entirely Indigenous led. Elders, filmmakers, web developers, artists, and educators were deeply involved in project development.

NEW SECURITY SYSTEM HIGH DEF CAMERAS INSTALLED

Funding from the Regional Development Corporation (Community Investment Fund) and Downtown Fredericton Inc. allowed us to purchase and install a brand new security camera system at the museum in 2022.

The new system includes 20 cameras, four on the exterior and 16 in the interior of the building focusing on our galleries. It was installed by Fredericton's Quality Sound and Alarm.

These cameras are high definition and have already changed the way that we operate at the museum, giving us a greater sense of security about artefacts as well as the safety of our employees and volunteers.

Thanks to Fredericton MLAs, Hon. Dominic Cardy and David Coon for supporting our application to RDC and to Downtown Fredericton Inc.

ARTIST IN RESIDENCE GETS NB EXPOSURE

Residency has led to exhibits in 3 locations in province

Rhonda Simmons' artist residency at the Fredericton Region Museum is proof positive that our residency experience can be a stepping stone to great things for local artists!

Rhonda's three-piece assembly art "Mind, Body and Spirit of the Enslaved" that she created for her residency last summer led to an exhibit at the NB Black History Society museum in Saint John where she gave a lively talk on her work to a large crowd who stayed behind long after the event to mingle and ask questions.

Media coverage in Saint John led to additional interest from the NB Black Artists Alliance. The Alliance invited Rhonda to participate in an exhibition of Black artists' work at the Gallery on Queen, Fine Art in Fredericton.

This in turn, led to additional exposure for Rhonda with one of her pieces being featured on the poster advertising the month long exhibition in downtown Fredericton.

During Black History Month in February, Rhonda was also asked to participate in a virtual presentation to RCMP across Canada about her experiences as a Black artist.

One of the most important achievements to come out of Rhonda's artist residency at the Museum is that she has been selected to showcase her art the

He was also recognized that year with a Lifetime Achievement Award by UFO Magazine, one of numerous accolades he received over 40 years of research that made him a household name in the UFO community.

To mark the 15th anniversary of "Stanton Friedman Day", the Fredericton Region Museum intends to host a fun filled day for adults, families and children on the theme of UFOs.

Events include films, presentations by colleagues of Stanton who can speak to his contribution to the field of Ufology, games and workshops on UFO art and mannequin making to name a few. We'll also have contests including best Alien costume.

Description:

First World War period German Army body armour consisting of a steel breast plate with three additional interlinking abdominal and groin plates, all connected by two canvas straps, and suspended from the wearer's shoulders via fitted curved panels.

Material:

Steel, felt and canvas. Each steel plate had additional rectangularshaped blocks of thick felt added to deaden contact noise between the plates.

History of Use:

First World War period German Army body armour of the type initially issued to front line troops in 1916. The equipment weighed between 20lbs

and 24lbs (9kg and 11kg), reflecting the two variant sizes produced; 500,000 sets were issued to men on the Western Front.

Capable of stopping low velocity fragments and shrapnel, the Sappenpanzer (trench armour) was, due to its weight, only practical for troops on sentry duty and machine gunners operating in static positions and was designed to be used together with the armoured brow plate that hooked on to the steel helmet. This armour was capable of stopping a pistol round but only superficially helpful against rifle fire. It also helped protect against bayonet and other edged weapons thrusts. The additional weight tired the wearer quickly, defeating any tactical advantage he might have had by wearing it.

Rare Epaulette

The York-Sunbury Historical Society and the Fredericton Region Museum is fortunate to have this rare piece of militaria in our collection. (1969.13.40)

This epaulette belonged to an officer of the York County Militia. The words "York Co. Militia" around the top of the button with "Y.C.M." at the bottom confirm this attribution.

This unit was raised as the York County Regiment of Militia in 1787. It existed until the sedentary militia was disbanded following the introduction of the Canada Militia Act in 1868.

Underside of epaulette

Over the years, the regiment had up to five battalions that were based in Fredericton, Kingsclear, Douglas and New Maryland.

Two of its battalions were used to form the new Carleton County militia when that county was separated from York in 1834.

Officers wore epaulettes like this as badges of rank. They were attached by laces to the shoulders of the tunic.

Epaulettes also served as vestigial armour to protect the shoulders from sword cuts.

This style of epaulettes was in use from circa 1829 until 1855 when uniforms were simplified during the Crimean War of 1853 to 1856.

This epaulette would originally have had a bright glit finish which has tarnished over the passage of almost 200 years. They would have been worn as a pair and stored in a metal box when not in use.

Based on the length of the fringe, this epaulette would have been worn by a junior officer (Captain or Lieutenant).

With further research, it might be possible to identify the officer who wore it.
