

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#### ALL THINGS FROGGY THIS SUMMER

The redeveloped Coleman Frog exhibit was the main attraction on Froggy Weekend July 30 and 31, 2022 with more than 500 visitors coming through the museum for a fun filled weekend of children's art, games, musical theatre and froggy scavenger hunts. This is the first time in many years that the Museum hosted a Froggy Weekend and based on its success we plan to do it again in 2023!

#### THE COLEMAN FROG EXHIBIT

The new in-house exhibit brings to life the lobby of the old Barker House Hotel as it must have looked when it was originally located on the site of the current day Canada Post Office across the street from the Museum on Queen. Front and center is the ever popular Coleman

Frog, perched on the same oak table that is featured in the famous photograph taken in the 1880s.

Interior finishes include original embossed tin wall panels, curved ornamental moulding and an enclosed, see through cabinet featuring dishes and cutlery similar to what would have been used in the hotel's restaurant. Framed archival documents include original menus featuring the soup of the

#### Games, Facepainting, Prizes, Scavenger Hunts and **Presentations**

More than 300 visitors came to the museum on our first ever Stanton Friedman Day on August 27, 2022. While many of the events and activities were held outside under

the arches and in front of the museum, there was plenty to keep our visitors busy inside with guided tours, childrens' art activities on the balcony, alien scavenger hunts and presentations in the afternoon featuring Martin Montplaiser, a filmmaker and researcher who worked closely with Stanton, and Jim Lawrence of the NB UFO Network group.

With sci-fi music playing in the background, visitors were treated to a full day of activities, from alien bowling on the stage to stations on "How to make an alien", "How to make a UFO" and "Alien facepainting". Ron Rhinehart won our Stanton Friedman look-alike contest! We even brought out the alien statues from "Family of Visitors" and they were a great attraction for the crowd. Stanton Friedman Day marked the 15th anniversary of the City of Fredericton declaring Stanton Friedman Day on August 27, 2007 and based on the success in 2022, we intend to do it again in 2023!

#### **PURCHASE OF HEPA** FILTERS AIR PURIFIERS

Creating a safe workplace for staff and visitors was a high priority this year. Funding from the Cultural Spaces Emergency Fund paid for three new HEPA filter air purifiers that we placed in high traffic areas in the museum (main office, work room and kitchen).

We were also able to purchase safety items such as plexiglass dividers for work area, traffic flow barriers and COVID-19 floor signage that encourage visitors to follow a safe path in the museum, and Fredericton Region Museum branded COVID-19 filter masks.

This gave us a certain measure of security during the summer when COVID was still a serious concern and we had many staff and visitors moving in and out of the museum.

#### **BATHROOM RENOS**

Funding from the Cultural Spaces Fund also paid for long overdue renovations to our two bathrooms which will take place in January, 2023. Upgrades include touchless taps, touchless paper towel dispensers and other improvements to bring the museums' bathroom facilities up to modern standards.

#### CELEBRATING FREDERICTON'S 175TH AT THE FRM IN 2023

In 2023, Fredericton will celebrate its 175th anniversary of incorporation as a city. In anticipation of this milestone, plans are well underway to unveil a new permanent exhibition in the Museum, celebrating 175 years of civic life.

Through artefacts and images, our new exhibition will document the social history of Fredericton as it existed in 1848. The renovated museum space will enable visitors to explore the rich material culture of our city, around six social history themes:

- Commercial life;
- The parish and city;
- Treaty ways;
- Changing environments;

- Provincial and military life; and
- Social happenings.


From a tavern sign that once adorned the drinking establishment of Robert Irwin on Regent Street, to Bishop John Medley's writing desk, and stained-glass windows that once embellished St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic church, the planned exhibition will feature many treasures from our community's past. It will also enable the rotation of artefacts displayed each year over time.

Arrangements are also underway to make the artefacts and their background history available via social media, as yet another way of celebrating Fredericton's 175th.

The collection of the Fredericton Region Museum originated in 1932, commencing with an initial founding donation of artefacts by Major Frank A. Good, who was an instructor at the Provincial Normal School. Over 90 years

> since, the Museum has assembled an impressive array of artefacts that document Fredericton's past.

Funding for this new summer exhibition came from the City of Fredericton, Arts and Culture grant program, NB Heritage Branch Exhibit Renewal grant program and the York-Sunbury Historical Society.

Three First World War education trunk feature reproduction objects, archival records, and images documenting the war experiences of New Brunswick soldiers who served on the Western Front during the Great War of 1914 – 1918.

The Fredericton Region Museum is very pleased to announce the availability of its First World War Trunk, which documents the experiences of New Brunswick soldiers who served on the Western Front during the Great War of 1914-1918.

Designed for classroom use, these trunks offer students with hands-on experiences, and are available on loan from the museum.

We are also looking for teachers who would like to participate in a University of Ottawa inquiry regarding how New Brunswick students remember the First World War.

Inside each trunk, students will discover reproduction artefacts, archival records, and images documenting the war experiences of specific soldiers and nurses.

Available in both official languages, featured individuals include Ernest Brewer, Percy Winslow Grant, and Percy Guthrie (all of Fredericton), as well as Dora Hubbard (Burton), and Arthur Kelly (Stanley).

Acadian soldiers are represented by Alfred Belliveau (Fredericton), Félicien Roy (Moncton), Louis Daigle (St-Louis-de-Kent), and Jean Gaudet (Adamsville).

Teachers will find everything they need to provide a unique, informative, and hands-on experience for students learning about the First World War.

#### **FOCUS ON ARTEFACTS**

Officer's Regimental Coat



Regimental coat belonging to an unknown officer of His Majesty's New Brunswick Regiment of Fencible Infantry (NBFRI). Fredericton Region Museum 1969.2547.1.

Artefact 1969.2547.1 is a Regimental Coat that belonged to an unknown officer of His Majesty's New Brunswick Regiment of Fencible Infantry (NBRFI). This unit was formed in 1803. In 1810, it was raised to "line" status and became the 104th (New Brunswick) Regiment of Infantry (104th). It was disbanded in 1817. This unknown officer may have also served in the 104th.

The coat conforms to the specifications of the General Order of 24 December, 1811 which introduced a new, shorter garment for infantry officers, referred to as "A Regimental Coat, similar to the private Men's; but with Lappells to button over the front and body." This was intended to match the shorter coat, or jacket, that the infantry other ranks had worn since 1800.

The style of the coat presents a mixed message. The sloped pocket flaps on the skirts of the coat suggest a light infantry company, but the turnback device suggests a battalion company, as does the fact that there is only one epaulet (and no evidence of wings as would be worn by the Light Company).

This is unusual as there were specific dress regulations for the two Flank Companies (Grenadier and Light) and the eight Battalion Companies. The facings are buff (off white), a colour that was used by both the NBRFI and the 104th. The 37 (one is missing) silver buttons read "New Brunswick Regiment" which indicates the NBRFI. However, the pattern of the coat dates from 1811, after the regiment had become the 104th.

There would have been a lag time before this new pattern of coat was actually worn, probably not until the summer of 1812 at the earliest. The new coats would have had the proper 104th regimental buttons.

If the tails of the coat had been shortened, as is suggested in the accession notes, then it could have been modified and worn until the new pattern coats arrived from the tailors in England. There is also speculation that officers modified their coats prior to the 1811 clothing order being issued.

The question arises – who wore the coat? The answer is – we don't know. There is no clear link to who donated the coat prior to 1969 when all of the artefacts were reaccessioned. All that is known for certain is that the owner was an officer in the NBRFI and most likely the 104th. No matter whose coat this was, this is an interesting and

historically significant piece of New Brunswick military history. We are fortunate to have it in the collection of the York-Sunbury Historical Society.



#### **JAXON BAKER**

Jaxon Baker has been working at the Fredericton Region Museum since June, 2022 on a Young Canada Works Building Careers in Heritage grant program (YCW-BCH). Jaxon recently graduated from the Université de Montreal with a degree in Museology. His thesis focused on the relationship between donors and museums.

"My thesis for the Université de Montreal examined the role of private collectors in the 21st century and how they are affected by CCPERB (The Canadian Cultural Property Export Review Board). It discussed how the role of the private collector in the 21st century is fluid in nature and can be equal parts, philanthropist, project initiator, museum founder or personal gain.

It is important to note that especially in Canada, even though donors may be receive a benefit in terms of charitable tax receipt for their donations, it does not mean the arrangement is not mutually beneficial. The entire point of introducing the CCPERB is that

it was meant to keep artefacts, paintings and other objects of national import and significance in Canada. CCPERB gives private collectors an incentive to keep their pieces in Canada and gift them to museums, galleries and other public cultural spaces so that they can be viewed by the public.

One of the key conclusions was that the relationship between private collectors and heritage sector institutions is an integral part of the management of collections in Canada, and these institutions are doing their utmost to maintain these relationships."

#### **CONNOR FRASER**

Connor Fraser is a 3rd year Arts student at UNB, with a Major in French, Minor in English. Connor worked at the Museum for 11 weeks in summer 2022 on a Young Canada Works in Heritage Organizations (YCW-IHO) student employment program. In September 2022, we were able to transition Connor into a UNB Arts 4000 Internship program which will provide up to 23 weeks of

employment at 20 hours per week until the end of April, 2023. Financial assistance for this position comes from UNB and ICTC-WIL digital internship program.

Connor is working in Collections on a large archival collection, gaining professional work experience and skills development in digital technologies.

#### **AIDAN KEENAN**

Aidan Keenan worked at the museum since May 2022 in a UNB Summer Arts Internship position that was extended into December 2022. In the fall, Aidan undertook research for the 175th anniversary of Fredericton exhibit that will be launched in 2023. He also assisted Jaxon Baker and Connor Fraser on a large Collections management project.


